COURSE NUMBER: PHA 393

COURSE TITLE: APhA Institute on Substance Use Disorders

SEMESTER HOURS: 2

REQUIRED/ELECTIVE: Elective

PREREQUISITES: Enrollment in the American Pharmacists Association (APhA) Institute on Substance Use Disorders (SUD).

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course is open only to students who attend the APhA Institute on SUDs. The Institute addresses the causes of addiction as it relates to alcohol and illicit drugs including prevention and treatment strategies. Special emphasis is given to the disease concept of these disorders, morbidity and mortality, 12-step programs, and the impact of alcohol and illicit drug use on society. Students will learn how to provide appropriate assistance and support to patients affected by substance use disorders.

GRADING MODE:

In order to receive credit, students must enroll in this course directly through Creighton University after they have been accepted and enrolled in the APhA Institute. Then they are to do all the following:

- Participate in all required pre-APhA Institute activities and webinars.
- Attend every student session at the APhA Institute a university credit or Continuing Pharmacy Education code will be provided during each required session.
- Complete and submit the onsite attendance form with the provided attendance codes after the Institute is over for each student session to verify attendance.
- Complete the online assessment for each session.

After attending the APhA Institute, students must complete and submit a Final Reflection Paper. (See "Grading Scale" below.)

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

Lecture is the primary instructional method. In addition, attendance at daily 12-step meetings, small group discussions, role-playing, and a final reflection on these experiences will play an integral role in the APhA Institute.

MEETING TIMES:

The APhA Institute runs for four to five days and is held at the University of Utah in the University Guest House and Conference Center. Students must attend all required sessions.

INSTRUCTOR(S):

There are between 20 and 25 speakers during the APhA Institute.

Edward M. DeSimone, II, R.Ph., Ph.D., FAPhA, is the Instructor of Record as it relates to elective credit. He will verify attendance, read all reflection papers, and provide the students' grades for the APhA Institute participation.

JUSTIFICATION:

Pharmacists have frequent contact with patients who have an SUD or are struggling with loved ones who are afflicted by this disorder. Pharmacists, their loved ones, and other health professionals may have these same experiences. In order to interact effectively with and assist anyone dealing with an SUD, pharmacists and other health professionals must have an understanding of the disease of addiction and substance use disorders, its impact on the individual and society, and the various treatment options available.
